

Peterborough Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers Annual General Meeting 10<sup>th</sup> June 2023 at Marston St Lawrence Minutes

- **890.** Welcome: The meeting began at 17:46 with a welcome to all by the President. He went on to pass on to members appreciation received from Bishop John Holbrook on the ringing undertaken for the Coronation.
- **891.** John Beresford proposed the **Vote of Thanks** on behalf of the Wellingborough branch. He thanked the incumbents for the use of the bells, Revd Nick Leggatt for taking the service, Ian Chapple and Simon Dixon for arranging the ringing, the Culworth branch for providing the tea and the Marston Estate for the field for car parking.
- **892.** Members who had passed away since the last AGM were remembered during the service. - **893.** Members eligible for **50 years membership** were read out. They were: Christine Downey (Bozeat), David Hamson (Brixworth), Caroline Mitchell (Thrapston branch), Nick Parsons (Northampton), John Riley (Peterborough Cathedral) and Alison Willgress (Nether Heyford). Alison Willgress was presented her certificate by the President.
- **894.** There were proposals for **Honorary Life Membership** for Bridget & Graham Paul. This was proposed at the Northampton branch AGM by Louise Griffiths and seconded by Giles Willson. Giles spoke of their long period of ringing and their accomplishments, service to ringing in Northampton, the ART teaching and the Northampton Hub. There were no comments from the floor and the proposal moved to a vote. The proposals were carried by those present.
- **895.** The Minutes of the past meetings were reviewed by members, These were proposed for acceptance by John Beresford, seconded by Anne Cook and the meeting agreed the motion.
- **896.** There were no matters arising
- **897.** The Guild Management report and Accounts had been circulated to members in the annual report. Alistair Donaldson proposed that this be received by the meeting, seconded by Cathy Dixon and the motion was carried.
- **898.** Fees recommendations were read by Helen Allton on behalf of the F&GP committee. These were that:
  - a. Membership remain at £7 for adults and £3.50 for junior members
  - b. Peal fees remain at 0p per rope
  - c. Central council fees for the next meeting, to be held in Ipswich in September, are up to £150 to cover return rail fare and 1 night's accommodations.

These proposals were made by Helen Allton, seconded by Alistair Donaldson and agreed by the meeting.

**899.** Bell Fund: There were no grant applications to be proposed at this meeting. John Beresford, as steward, proposed a sum of up to £2000 to be put aside for minor projects in the next year. This was seconded by Alison Byrnes and carried.

**900.** Elections of Officers. The following office holders had been proposed and seconded in advance of the meeting, there were no further nominations from the floor. All nominees were, therefore elected.

Alistair Donaldson thanked Jane Sibson for her many years' service as a Central Council Representative, as she is now standing down from this role after 24 years.

There had been no nominations for Safeguarding Officer or Youth Officer. John Beresford volunteered for Safeguarding Officer and was proposed by Alistair Donaldson, seconded by Robert Wood. This was agreed by the meeting. The post of Youth Officer remains vacant.

The Newsletter Editor, Jonathan Stuart, asked for anyone interested in acting as an Assistant Newsletter Editor to get in touch. There's a lot involved in turning around the submissions from branches, officers and other submissions within a short period of time and an assistant to share the load would be greatly appreciated.

- 901. The Guild Calendar was listed
  - a. Summer Festival 2023 9<sup>th</sup> September in Towcester branch. Ringing location tbc, contest and evening ringing at Towcester.
  - b. Spring Meeting  $2024 13^{\text{th}}$  April in Guilsborough branch
  - c. AGM 2024 8<sup>th</sup> June in Northampton. Ringing at all 4 Northampton towers, service in All Saints, meeting in St Giles' hall.
  - d. Summer Festival 2024 14<sup>th</sup> September in Daventry branch.
  - e. The 10 bells for the remainder of the year are 8<sup>th</sup> July at Rothwell, 9<sup>th</sup> September at Daventry and 11<sup>th</sup> November, location to be confirmed. As this is Remembrance day the timing may be adjusted.

In 2024 the 10 bells will continue, taking into account the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary arrangements. Date are: 13<sup>th</sup> January, 9<sup>th</sup> March, 29<sup>th</sup> June, 14<sup>th</sup> September and 9<sup>th</sup> November.

- f. Second Saturday sessions are ongoing and future events include an intermediate 8 bell practice, Stedman, Grandsire, Plain Bob, running a practice and other courses.
- **902.** The 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary committee reported on the planned events for 2024. The intention has been to include ringing and social events to bring the Guild together. And to eat cake. The planned events were announced as follows:

In addition to events there will be anniversary merchandise, featuring the anniversary logo. Mugs are available, clothing can be ordered. A calendar featuring the images entered into the photo contest at last year's Summer Festival should be available at this year's Summer festival as should jigsaws featuring a commissioned artwork.

There is also some ringing planned. We aim to achieve 100 peals, including those marking specific ringing events of the past. As not everyone can ring peals we'd also like to achieve 100 firsts, be those first quarters, first as conductor, first time calling call changes, first time ringing a method. This would be open to all members. And we'd like there to be a piece of ringing in every tower across the Guild. Not necessarily a peal or quarter just a piece of ringing.

At the conclusion of this, Jayne Horne spoke to thank the committee for their efforts, putting together the calendar and merchandise. This was supported by the meeting.

- **903.** With the **Central Council** meeting not until September Simon Dixon reported there are no proposals yet forthcoming for discussion. There is a potential proposal to reduce the size of the Council, potentially reducing the number of Guild reps from 4 to 2. However, there are no proposals available at present. Derek Jones raised the question as to the value of the Central Council meeting now that the Central Council Executive has taken over the majority of the Council's activity.
- **904.** The **Rule Change proposal** was introduced by the Secretary, reminding members that the committee had been formed by the GMC in March 2022 and comprised Richard Allton, Sarah Bence, John Beresford, Chris FitzGerald, Derek & Sue Jones. The committee members had worked diligently to bring the proposed rule change before the meeting.

Sarah Bence introduced the changes. These are intended to provide segregation between the Constitution, that defines what the Guild does, and the Rules that define how it is to be carried out. There are to reflect the Charity commission oversight of the Constitution, but not the rules. There is a move to future proof the Rules so that changes can be made without necessarily having to update the Constitution. However, this has been carried out with consideration of the Guild's history.

Sue Jones added that she also endorsed the work the committee had done, always bearing in mind that there is a lot that the Guild would want to continue doing, while reflecting that modern means of communication exist.

Derek Jones described the proposed rules as an evolution, not a revolution. He noted that the last time the Guild's rules had been reviewed was almost 50 years ago, so a revisit was timely. These reflect new posts, such as the 100 club representative which has occupied an anomalous position since it had been introduced. The aim was to keep what was good and bring the rules up to date.

The President thanked the committee for their work and opened the proposal to the floor. Giles Willson expressed some concern about the use of the word 'discretionary' and the potential discriminatory aspect of members over 75 not having to pay a subscription. The wording was discussed, but no alternative wording was suggested by the meeting.

Geoff Pullin noted a number of changes that he considered to be positive improvements and asked a number of questions.

Alison Willgress noted that as the rules were intended to be more flexible with regards to changing them, it would be as well to move to accept these rules as presented, and revisit as and when alternative wording or experience showed that modifications were required.

At this point, the meeting was adjourned, to allow members to move their cars from the field, which was planned to be locked from 7 pm. The meeting was adjourned at 18:45 and restarted at 19:05 pm.

The committee addressed the questions raised, to the satisfaction of those present. The meeting moved to a vote and this was passed, exceeding the 66% of those present to do so.

Peterborough Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers Summer Festival 9<sup>th</sup> September 2023 at Towcester Minutes

- 1. Welcome: The meeting began at 18:00 with a welcome to all by the President, who also welcomed the five teams that had entered.
- 2. Striking Contest Results. The Master started by introducing the judges, Dave & Nicky Carling from Leicestershire. Dave started by saying that Towcester were a lovely set of bells and that they had been well rung all afternoon. The thunderstorms, which may have made judging "interesting" had fortunately held off. He reminded all that the rules state that the first 160 rows are judged. With their scoring system, a maximum of 320 faults were available, and no teams came close to that. All bands rang triples, and all achieved good ringing, with multiple consecutive leads with no faults scored. Each team performance was described, and positive feedback given before the results were announced.

Towcester were judged the winners, and the Harry Wooding Memorial Trophy was presented to Richard Allton on behalf of the Towcester branch team. Each team was presented with a certificate recording their performance and the judges were rewarded with a suitable token of our appreciation.

- 3. Vote of Thanks: Brenda Dixon proposed the vote of thanks to Weedon Bec, Cold Higham & Towcester, the Revds. Barbara Gallagher & Paula Challen and Churchwarden Pauline Pearson for the use of the bells; to John Pardoe & Chris Bulleid for making the arrangements; Richard Allton, Chris Bulleid & Simon Dixon for running the ringing across the day; to Dave & Nicky Carling for judging; and to the Towcester branch for making, serving and tidying up after the excellent tea. The meeting expressed its appreciation in the usual manner.
- **4. Training Update:** The Master gave an update on the training events. There are training events for October through to January, including several courses on ringing and leading up and down, which has proven very popular. Due to the events of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary in

2024, there will be fewer training events laid on, the website will be kept up to date with those that are laid on.

- 5. Bell Fund: There was one application for a bell fund grant:
  - a. **St Peter's, Northampton**: Provision of sound control in St Peter's to support the training centre in the adjacent Old Black Lion. Sound control is needed to avoid interference with the neighbours with a potential increase in ringing activity in this location. The cost is £12,000 and a grant of £2,400 was proposed by John Beresford, seconded by Richard Allton, and approved by the meeting.
- 6. CCCBR Meeting Report: On behalf of the Guild's 4 representatives, Simon Dixon gave an update on the recent CCCBR meeting in Ipswich. The morning gave an opportunity to review the activity of the different workgroups. There were two major points to report. First will be the launch of a questionnaire to establish who is doing what in ringing and where. This will be going out to tower captains and ringers. All ringers are encouraged to complete this. The more accurate data we have, the better this will be able to inform the second major point, the Ringing 2030 initiative. A body has been contracted to provide professional support in producing outwards looking materials to increase ringing publicity and recruitment.

The other motion that took considerable discussion was to reduce the size of the council meeting. It had not been well handled, with incorrect numbers being sent out in the motion and no identification of knock-on implications. Even those in favour were put off by the way the motion had been handled and after a thorough debate this was soundly rejected.

Additional detail motions to bring the Small Societies payment in line with the change to subscriptions for societies, and to relocate the CCCBR library to a room within the Taylors bell foundry museum were carried.

The Ringing World AGM noted that the two royal occasions, and the increased ringing and donations made for those, resulted in a profitable year in 2022. Changes, such as a monthly magazine style publication are being considered.

Peterborough Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers Spring Meeting 13<sup>th</sup> April 2024 at Cold Ashby Minutes

- 1. Welcome: The meeting began at 18:00 with a welcome to all by the President, who also welcomed the 21 teams that had entered.
- 2. Vote of Thanks: Odette Dawkins proposed the vote of thanks to the incumbent of Spratton, Guilsborough and Cold Ashby, the Revd Alison Twigg, for the use of the bells and to the Guilsborough branch for making the arrangements; Bill Adcock & John Beresford for running the ringing at Spratton and Simon Dixon for the ringing at Cold Ashby to follow, to the judges for agreeing to judge the contest; and to Cold Ashby for the use of the village hall and all those involved in putting on the most excellent tea. The meeting expressed its appreciation in the usual manner.

Post meeting note: The ringing at Spratton was run by Richard Allton & Paul Mason.

- 3. Bell Fund: There were three applications for a bell fund grant:
  - a. **Badby**: for refurbishment of the installation at a cost of £55, 815 a grant of £8,400 was indicated. This was proposed by John Beresford, seconded by Nick Elks, and approved by the meeting.
  - b. **Corby**: replace sliders and running gear at a cost of £12,980 a grant of £2,000 was indicated. This was proposed by John Beresford, seconded by Sue Marsden, and approved by the meeting.
  - c. Greetham: works to the bells and steeple, including a new floor at a cost of £53,814
     a grant of £8,100 was indicated. Proposed by John Beresford, seconded by Louis
     Totaro and approved by the meeting.

Based on the assumption that all grants awarded and not claimed to date fall due, the BRF has a sum of £30,500 currently unallocated.

## 4. Notices:

a. Open day: This is to take place on 11<sup>th</sup> May, and towers across the Guild have been identified. All members were encouraged to help out at the towers in their area and to enjoy ringing at a variety of towers across the Guild.

- b. AGM: This will be the 8<sup>th</sup> June. Due to Northampton holding its carnival on the same day, the plan to ring at towers in Northampton is not viable. Arrangements will be shared once they have been put in place.
- Guild ten bell: Due to the various activities for the second Saturdays, the next ten bell is Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> June. Location still tbc.
- 5. Old Black Lion. An update was given by Alistair Donaldson. Due to the change in the specification of the work athe Old Black Lion, the CCCBR has decided to withdraw the earmarked funds and to cease supporting the proposed National Ringing Centre. The Guild has been asked if it can take the project on, The Guild, of itself, is not prepared to commit to this, but is open to a Guild member coming on board to take leadership of this. This would include sourcing funding for the necessary installation in the Stables. If there is an enthusiastic individual in the Guild who has appropriate skills and enthusiasm to take this forward, they would have the Guild's support. To be discussed at the AGM.
- **6.** This has no impact on the provision of sound control at St Peter's which was awarded a grant at a previous meeting and is separately funded.
