## News from the Branches

## Daventry Branch

## Never before

W hen the N ovember coronavirus pandemic shut-down was eased, it gave some opportunity for ringing well-spaced bells during December up to Christmas Day. At D aventry, we were able to ring in face coverings on five bells - $3,5,7$, 9,10 or six if treble and tenor were rung by the same household. The doors and window were wide open during ringing for the churchwarden's wedding and Sunday services. The C hristmas D ay service was hastily transferred to Zoom. At Badby in December we had the most services in a month since January 2020 and were able to ring for all four of them, using 1,3 and 5, which were deemed to be warmer to ring than 2,4 and 6 with the door wide open! T here was similar ringing at Byfield, Litchborough and Staverton. We were plunged back into a further shut-down from Boxing D ay until the time of writing.
'M eetings'
O ur new Guild President encouragingly visited the branch on N ovember 7 by setting up a Zoom call. A few of us assembled for a natter.

We held two branch gatherings using Zoom webinar kindly supplied by Leanne $M$ artin.
It was nice to see so many faces at the C arol G athering on D ecember 12. I think 21 devices connected with 33 people plus a cat and a dog to be seen or heard. We were privileged to have Kings C ollege C ambridge and the Albert H all providing carols. M ichael and Barbara gave us their usual style of presentation, Val read Betjeman on Bristol bells. Leanne juggled the controls including 'mute all' and M ichael recovered quickly from being cut off in mid-flow by chair Jane! O ur internet provided staccato videos, a few jerky movements and tinned sound but it was nice to see people again!
To meet Guild rules, we decided to hold our AGM by Zoom at 6pm but moved the date to January 30 to give the Treasurer more time to finalise the accounts and have them examined. We weren't going anywhere else that month!
There were 32 present, including three visiting Guild 0 fficers (President, Secretary, Steward) and Ed M ortimer Zoomed in from C anada ( $6^{\prime \prime}$ snow and 150 C). We are now veterans of using Zoom and Jane Rands kept us all in order. M ichael H aighton set us off with prayers and remembering members who have died since the last AGM. The reports were short. All officers and committee were re-elected:
The 'Tower Rota' was left sparse:
M arch 13 - Branch Quiz by Zoom organised by Shirley Waterhouse.
M ay 8 - an outing was postponed to 2022 and replaced with a branch gathering by Zoom or in person depending on circumstances.


June 12 - if meetings in person are possible by then, we are scheduled to host the Guild AGM at Weedon, otherwise the $G$ uild will reorganize to cope, like 2020.
July or August - a branch walk organised by Alison W illgress, most likely without ringing.

The branch committee will meet to recommend a ringing programme to suit any relaxation of pandemic restrictions as the huge vaccination campaign takes effect.
It was noted that the branch website, which was set up in 2012, will need to be moved to a new provider after BT announced that its free C ommunity facility will close in M ay 2021.

## Towers

Ian W illgress has kept us up to date with progress at Church Stowe. The tuning of the original 1590 bell 2 from the heritage ring of four caused them to sound in the minor scale, so it has been 'retired' to be a chiming bell, whereas the 1390 tenor has been given a new lease of life! A new bell 3 was cast in 0 ctober, complete with canons and has been tuned to give a major scale ring of five. All the bells and the new treble, a recycled Warner bell, were cleaned and assembled with new fittings ready for delivery on February 1. They were unloaded under the gaze of well-distanced villagers by volunteers ready to install them under Stephen Westerman's direction. In the meantime a vast amount of major structural masonry work has taken place on the safely leaning tower with Saxon origins, so much so that the fresh mortar and render will need to be undisturbed by ringing of the bells well into the summer.

Brian Foley has been testing his patience for many weeks trying to make the clock chiming mechanism at H oly Cross, D aventry work reliably. HeZoomed into our AGM to say he was getting there. We understand that now the night silencing system upsets the chime synchronisation!

Eric Bates died on 0 ctober 25, aged 89 years. Eric joined the Branch at Byfield around 1974 but had not rung for several years. H is name was cast onto the new treble at Byfield in 1991. He had been organist at Byfield from 1949. D avid C ooke died on O ctober 26, aged 80 . He had been poorly for a few years with a succession of ailments, which stopped him from ringing. H e joined the Branch in 1995 after moving to $N$ ewnham when he was a craft instructor at H M YO I O nley. He made the glass display case for Fred H utt's collection of ringing association badges in Byfield belfry. D avid helped with teas at our branch meeting at $N$ ewnham in February 2020. Hilda Collins died peacefully on January 21 aged 95 with coronavirus. As Hilda Smith, she joined the Branch at N ether (or 'Lower' as it was until January 1,1966 ) H eyford in 1944 having learned to ring when the ban on ringing during World War II was lifted in 1943 along with Bill C ollins, who she married four years later. Hilda was Branch Secretary and Treasurer in 1946 and then a member of the Branch Committee in 1980-1, GMC Rep 1984-91, Branch Treasurer 1986-8, a Synod Rep on the Guild M anagement Committee 1997-2008 and was elected a Life H onorary M ember of the Guild at the AGM in 2014. Hilda last rang at a branch meeting in

D ecember 2009 but remained a stalwart attender until 2014. Hilda was also a member of the Ladies Guild.
Sadly, attendance at all the funerals was severely limited by government pandemic regulations.

## NASSINGTON St M ary the Virgin and All Saints M arch 2021

Although we have had to curtail our ringing yet again since our last report in September 2020, we were able to do some ringing in the period.
D uring September and 0 ctober, we rang for Sunday
Services, with strict precautions in place, of course. We have been able to ring, successfully, Bob D oubles on
occasions. Also, we have rung Plain H unt D oubles and Plain H unt M inor, sometimes spliced, as well as lots of C all C hanges. Everybody enjoyed being able to ring 'real' bells for this limited time. Recently we have tolled the tenor, half muffled, for a number of funerals, which have, unfortunately, been a consequence of the C ovid pandemic.
We have continued our regular Friday M orning Practices in Ringing Room, normally with eleven or twelve ringers. We have moved on from Plain H unt D oubles and Plain H unt M inor to Grandsire D oubles and Bob D oubles. AIthough it is not the same as ringing 'real' bells, it has allowed us to meet regularly to socialise and to learn new methods, such as Reverse C anterbury, Grandsire D oubles with bobs and Bob M inor, which we have very rarely rung on 'real' bells. Let's hope this progression transfers into ringing on the bell s once we are allowed to do so again.
We have continued to support the trainee band at Wittering. They were just at the point of handling a bell when the first lockdown occurred, so have been unable to ring at all since then. To support them we have arranged a Ringing Room session on Tuesday evenings, where they have progressed from Rounds through C all Changes to Plain H unt D oubles and now Grandsire D oubles. This is a significant progression, as one or two had only had a few lessons in handling. Thus, here at $N$ assington, we have been able to maintain the spirit of our band during these strange times.

## Rutland Branch - No news this time

When I last compiled the Branch $N$ ewsletter we were in lockdown 1 we have subsequently had lockdown 2 and are now currently in lockdown 3!
$N$ ot to be thwarted by C ovid on the 24th O ctober 2020 the Branch ran its annual Fish and Chip Supper and quiz on zoom very successfully, the zoom master being Chris Bulleid and the quiz master Richard Yates. There were approximately 6 teams. Teams split off into break out rooms and discussed answers. C ongratulations go to the winning team Richard and H elen Allton, Jonathan and Barbara King and Simon and Kathy Dixon.
On the 25th 0 ctober 2020 ringing commenced on 3 bells at Greens N orton and Bradden for the first time since lockdown in M arch 2020, Bradden had brand new ropes blessed by Rev. Lulu Perry. Also on the 25th George (11 years old) one of our junior ringers rang for service at H oly C ross Pattishall, he rang his bell up, rang call changes and rang his bell down perfectly, well done George and well done M argaret Bulleid who taught him to ring.
O ur annual Branch Dinner that normally takes place at
the end of N ovember had to be cancelled and as Richard Yates observed it was the first time in 50 Years that this has happened, it has now been re-scheduled for N ovember 27th 2021.
Just shortly after this as of midnight on the 4th N ovember 2020 we went back into deeper lockdown and all ringing and regular worship was suspended for 1 month!
M eanwhile our branch ringing master has continued with his twice weekly ringing room sessions where we have rung a variety of different methods including St Nicholas at Christmas, keeping up the camaraderie and good cheer. Although I know this is small fry I'm proud to say I've learnt to treble bob and have rung inside to plain bob triples. I've also compiled a list for good excuses for when one is back in the ringing chamber here are some of the more notable ones that have made us laugh:- 'trouble with the internet, my earphones fell out, twitchy finger, the sun was in my eyes, stop bashing the space bar, someone's ringing my bell, the young farmers come to collect my C hristmas tree, I've burnt my space bar finger'! And of course there's the quote of 2020 "You're on mute!!" Seriously though Ringing Room has taken off all over the world and people are now ringing quarter peals both on tower bells and handbells... it's an amazing piece of technology and has certainly filled the void for the time being and has helped many with developing the skills associated with bell ringing.
Ringing Room also commenced for Pattishall junior ringers on Saturday mornings, a little light relief from home schooling, hosted by Alan Faiers and run by M argaret Bulleid for Alfie, George and Giorgia, they managed to plain hunt fairly successfully. M argaret Bulleid also commenced one to one tied bell practice for the juniors at H oly C ross Pattishall.
There has of course been little or no ringing at all within the branch apart from on Christmas D ay when 6 Bells were rung at Pattishall for Christmas D ay service, one resident remarked it was joyous to hear the bells and it gave them hope... we were so glad to hear that. In Bradden 5 Bells were rung, 120 of Grandsire and later in the day 120 of Stedman. Bells were also rung in Towcester and Ashton. All the above done according to current guidelines. In December 2020 Phil Cahill sadly passed away as many of you would remember he was instrumental in getting Blisworth Bells re-hung and augmented to 6. He worked tirelessly to raise the money needed and we have a lot to thank him for. He was a school teacher and a very talented artist, he painted a picture of the Greens N orton ringers which hangs in the Butchers Arms in Greens N orton.

I also have to report that Father James Atwell who was vicar of Towcester at the time of the bell project and branch chairman then subsequently provost of Bury St. Edmunds and then translated to be D ean of W inchester, had sadly passed away in December 2020.
On the 5th December 2020 Jim and Betty Linnell celebrated 50 years of marriage, the branch sent them a congratulatory bouquet of flowers.
O ur Branch steward Jonathan Stuart sent this report to be included in the newsletter:-
'T he acclaimed ring of twelve at St Lawrence'sTowcester was due a refurbishment in April 2020 but, like so many projects, this was delayed by C ovid restrictions and closures. Work started in the autumn when churches reopened, and was finally completed in December. This involved replacing the wheels on 6 to 12, which had been inherited in 1990 with the bells from Christ Church, Todmorden. The wheels dated back to 1897 and had reached the end of their useful lives. O ther work included replacing worn bearings, work to sliders and improvements to rope paths, all completed in time for Christmas ringing, only for new closures to be reimposed immediately afterwards. The band are understandably impatient to be making full use of their bells again, but for now they remain silent.'
Attached was this rather dramatic picture of Chris Bulleid removing some stubborn bolts, we always knew he was a bright spark



On Sunday 7th February friends of Jim Linnell joined him on a surprise Zoom C all to celebrate his 90th Birthday. There were friends from all over the diocese and also some from as far away as Cumbria, Jim who was elected to the Ancient Society of C ollege Youths in 1959, was also delighted that Susan (Swaz) Apter, $M$ aster of the ASCY, joined the call to add her congratulations on his landmark birthday.
O nce everyone had joined the call and surprise was sprung N igel Williams introduced Jim with a résumé of his peal history, he has rung a total of 428 peals and a few of the landmarks from these are:
He rang his first peal on 19th D ecember 1957 to celebrate the first birthday of Richard W illiam Yates (the current C hairman of the Towcester Branch PD G) and this peal was conducted by W illiam (Bill) A Yates Richard late father.
H is slowest peal was 5056 C ambridge Surprise M ajor at Sherborne Abbey which was rung 4 hours 8 minutes on 10th September 1966.
H is quickest peal was 5040 Spliced Surprise M inor at H elmdon which was rung in 2 hours 6 minutes, now there is still some debate regarding the correct record of the time for this peal - however Jim maintains that he can't possibly remember and this is how it's recorded in the Ringing World.
Then in M arch 1968 Jim rang his first peal with a certain Betty M ansfield who of course became Betty Linnell in 1970.
D etails of all these peals are recorded below.


Jim has always been there to teach people in the art of Church Bell Ringing and then encourage them to develop and expand their skills and knowledge. On the call was, Luisa Barrios, Georgina M orrell, Geoff W hite and D avid G ott who were recruited through the Ringing Remembers initiative and Jim has been
actively involved in their training. Also, on the call were some of the people that Jim had helped through their firsts in peal ringing, they were:
D avid Burbidge who rang the Treble to D oubles at Whitlebury in July 1960. Robin Rogers who rang the 3rd for his first minor inside at Towcester in D ecember 1961, this peal was also of note as it was the first peal on the bells since 9th N ovember 1912 when G randsire D oubles rung.
Barry Eaglesfild who rang theTreble to LincolnshireS. M ajor at All Saints Northampton in April 1963.
9 years old, Richard Yates trebling to Plain Bob M inor at M aids M oreton in O ctober 1966.
Jim has also been a long-time holder of a Season Ticket at Franklins G ardens the home of N orthampton Saints and to mark his birthday there were video messages from Graham M ckechnie N orthampton Saints H istorian and BBC N orthampton sports presenter and also Northampton SaintsC aptain Lewis Ludlam. Following this everybody was split into smaller groups or rooms and Jim was able to move between them and share memories and stories of not the events al ready mentioned but many more on more of a oneto-one basis.
D espite the current situation we all find ourselves in, Jim managed to have a wonderful time and managed to mark his 90th birthday, all that remains now is for us to safely get through the current lockdown, for the pubs to reopen and to have a pint or two with Jim and relive all these stories again.

Sadly I have to report that just shortly after his 90th birthday celebrations Jim's wife Betty sadly passed away. She was a lovely kind hearted lady and will be greatly missed by us all. RIP Betty Linnell.

There is news that many ringers within the branch have received their first Covid jabs so there is a chink of light at the end of the very long dark tunnel and in the fullness of time we will all hopefully return to towers to ring.

## Betty Linnell 8.5.1937-18.2.2021

Looking through all the cards, letters and messages Jim has received over the last week it is clear to see that Betty was loved and admired by so many people from all walks of life.
Betty was born in D uncote, N r Towcester in M ay 1937 and lived there for all her life.
Her close family revolved around Greens Norton Church and her Father Arthur $M$ ansfield was the tower captain for many years.
After learning to ring as a teenager she soon caught the ringing bug and Betty
 1954.

Betty married Jim Linnell a fellow ringer from W hittlebury in 1970 and Jim took over from Betty's father as G reens N orton Tower captain.
Although Betty rang hundreds of quarter peals she will always be remembered best for her incredible loyalty to G reens N orton Bellringers and being instrumental in teaching new ringers al ong with the support she gave to neighbouring towers Bradden and Easton Neston.
D uring the $60 \mathrm{~s}, 70 \mathrm{~s}$, and eighties Betty was the assistant secretary to Bill Yates for the Towcester branch and she worked tirelessly arranging some very memorable ringing outings across the country. M any ringers still remember those special days with such fondness. H er favourite method was alway K ent!

Betty organised many bell ringing tea meetings, and social events for the Towcester branch and will be remembered as a quiet, kind lady who always went out of her way to help others and encourage new ringers. She hardly ever missed a practice night at Greens N orton and was always there for all service ringing, H er loyalty, sound faith and dedication was at the the centre of everything she did even after Betty received a cancer diagnosis she still rang for services whenever and wherever she could.
The bell ringing community gave Betty an amazing platform to make lifelong friends and we are all better people for knowing her.

## Work to the Bells of St Lawrence Towcester

Just over thirty years ago, in 1989, eight bells were acquired from C hrist C hurch Todmorden, Yorkshire, and hung in the tower of St Lawrence in 1990, along with four new bells. The new bell frame was built locally by the late N igel Brewer of Farm \& Industrial Buildings of Northampton, and the labour was
 provided by theTowcester ringers and friends; it used frame sides from the redundant church of St John the Divine Leicester (the ten bells of which form the basis of the peal of twelve at Peterborough Cathedral). M any of the original wooden fittings from
Todmorden, nearly 100 years old at the time, were re-used. The installation, masterminded by Andrew Wilby, was and has been a great success, and the St Lawrence Society of Ringers is rightly proud of their wonderful
bells. Last year an appeal was launched to replace or repair many of the original fittings, including new wheels for the heaviest bells, which had come to the end of their useful lives and were beginning to cause issues for the ringers with the "feel" and "go" of the bells.
Thanks to the generosity of the ringers, people and

organisations of Towcester and the surrounding area, and the Peterborough D iocesan Guild of ringers, the necessary funds were raised, and the work took place between 14th and 24th $N$ ovember last year. The new wheels and fittings were supplied by Taylor's Bell Foundry in Loughborough, with two members of their bell hanging team there at various points to work al ongside the local ringing volunteers, namely Brett M asters, John Stanworth, John W hite, Chris Bulleid, and Jonathan King.
It would not be true to say that everything went smoothly or to plan, but challenges were expected and eventually all were overcome!
A summary of the main work undertaken:

- Replacement of the wheels of the 7 oldest and heaviest bells
- Replacement of the worn slider runner boards and slider pins
- Adjustment to some clappers to improve evenness of striking of the bells
- Maintenance or replacement of bearings
- Revision of roping of bells 4 and 5 to reduce wear and tear
- Tidy up and clear out of thirty years of accumulated detritus

M oral support (and coffee) was provided by those members of the band who remembered doing all this kind of thing thirty years ago, but now couldn't imagine hopping in and out of the bell frame in the way they once did! Far more importantly, the Reverend Paula C hallen and husband Steve at the V icarage provided cake at


The bells were tested individually following the work, with marked
 improvement to their handling as a result. N ow all we need is the chance to ring them all properly once more, which sadly is not possible under current restrictions, although special dispensation was given nationally to allow the bells to be rung for Christmas, albeit only six were rung, rather than all twelve.
Since $M$ arch last year, the ringers have remained in regular contact with each other, substituting our usual Friday evening practice in the tower with Zoom meetings and quizzes. We also managed to hold an online Annual Christmas D inner, welcoming 40 members and friends to
a very enjoyable evening; sadly, the event coincided with news of the death that day of James Atwell, who we had been hoping to see online at the dinner along with his wife Lorna. James was vicar of Towcester at the time of the original bell scheme thirty years ago, and he was a tremendous support to us all in our efforts. Joanne W ilby, St Lawrence Society of Ringers
